

City Council Updates

Highview Terrace Preliminary Plan In May, City Council approved a change to the Preliminary Plan for the Highview Terrace subdivision. The change includes decreasing the number of lots, reconfiguring some lots, regrading the detention basin for stormwater purposes and other items.

Prosecution Services City Council approved an agreement with the City of Xenia to provide prosecution services on behalf of the city in Xenia Municipal Court. Prior to this agreement, the city contracted directly with the prosecutor.

Tax Budget In July, Council approved the annual tax budget ordinance. The tax budget is a financial plan for the operations of the next calendar year. The budget is submitted to the county budget commission and used to fix property tax rates. This is not the final budget that Council approves for the following fiscal year.

Annual Wage Increase Following Council approval in July, City employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement, received a 2% wage increase effective August 1. This wage increase was included in the 2016 budget.

Definition of Kennel In July, City Council approved a revision to the Zoning Code to remove "training" from the definition of a dog kennel. The Planning Board recommended this change at their June 22 meeting.

Municipal Code In July, Council approved the removal of certain sections of the General Offenses Code which are duplicates of the Ohio Revised Code.

LED Streetlights City streets will be looking a little brighter at night thanks to new, street LED lights. The city contracts with Miami Valley Lighting LLC to provide and maintain our city's streetlights. City Council approved an agreement with MVL to upgrade our streetlights to new LED technology. This upgrade will save in electric costs and the lights will last longer with fewer outages. Contractors have already begun replacing the lights and will replace all 90 lights in 2016.

New City Website

The city launched a new website in April. The site incorporates our new city logo and provides easier access for residents to find city services and other local information. If you have not visited the new site, please take a moment and look around. We have included links and information on services provided by Greene County and other local community organizations.



City Council

The legislative and policy-making body of the City is comprised of a Mayor and six council members elected at large on a non-partisan basis. The Council hires a professional City Manager who operates the city on a day-to-day basis.

Council Vacancy Jon Martin submitted his resignation to City Council. Council advertised for the opening in July with resumes due by July 29. City Council will be conducting interviews and appoint a new Council Member to fill the term which expires in 2019.

Council Meetings The Bellbrook City Council invites you to attend its regular meetings on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of each month. Meetings begin at 7 pm.

The Works

Water Tower Repainting The contractor has begun repainting the Upper Bellbrook Road water tower. This project includes making repairs to the structure, painting the inside of the tower, and painting the exterior of the tower to include the new city logo.

Plantation Trail Culvert The culvert on Plantation Trail between Hillcrest Drive and Bellemeade Drive will be replaced beginning in August. The timeline for this project is yet to be determined. This section of the road will be closed during construction.

2016 Paving Program The streets included in the 2016 Paving Program are Amy Brook Circle, East Sudbury Court, North Linda Drive (from North Belleview Drive to Sugar Run Trail), North Sheffield Drive, Shadowleaf Drive, Sugar Run Trail, and Sugarwood Circle. The paving should be complete by mid-August.

Fire Hydrant Repainting The Service Department is currently in the process of repainting all 600+ fire hydrants on the city's water system. The project will probably continue into 2017.

Traffic Control Signs All traffic control signs in the city have been upgraded to the new prismatic style to meet new regulations. These signs provide better visibility in low light and for nighttime driving.

The Policeman's Badge

Police Department Awards Two Bellbrook Police Officers were given department awards at the Bellbrook City Council meeting on Monday, May 23. Police Chief Doug Doherty presented the Officer of the Year Award to Officer Nick Davis and the Community Policing Award to Officer Tony Ruble.

The Fred B. Caton Officer of the Year Award is given to an officer who has excelled in his or her duties during the previous year. Promoted from part-time to full-time in May 2014, Nick Davis is the most active and proactive officer in the department. Officer Davis works during the busiest shift of the day, from 4 pm to 12 midnight. In 2015, Officer Davis led the department in OVI (operating a vehicle impaired) arrests, citations, drug violation arrests and DUS (driving under suspension) citations. In September, Officer Davis located and arrested a suspect wanted in another jurisdiction. In addition, Officer Davis was one of several recipients of the Miami Valley's Top Cop Award.

The Community Policing Award is given to an officer who has a strong impact on the Bellbrook community. Officer Tony Ruble has served the Bellbrook Police Department for 14 years. Not only does Tony care about citizens during his regular work hours, but his community involvement continues during his time off. Officer Ruble spends time helping residents and neighbors with their properties and during school days, Officer Ruble can be seen in Stephen Bell Elementary School where the staff and students enjoy his presence.

Neighborhood Walks During the spring, Police Department staff walked a number of neighborhoods to allow residents the opportunity to meet them where they live. The command staff and members of the Police Department welcome residents and business owners to share their thoughts and concerns about the safety and security of our community. The leadership of the Bellbrook Police Department remains committed to serving and providing Bellbrook residents with the best customer service. The department will continue the walks in September. Watch Your Speed on Local Streets

School will be starting soon and kids will be walking to the bus in the mornings and afternoons. The city has speed boards to help notify people of their speed. In addition, the Police Department is active in enforcing speed. Please be mindful and slow down.

Power outages can be caused by a number of reasons. The most common reason for outages is falling tree limbs according to Dayton Power & Light (DP&L). Property owners can help prevent some outages by removing dead or diseased trees in your yard.

- **Keep in Touch.** Update DP&L at (800) 433-8500 of any changes in your contact information so they can reach you quickly
- **Update your Storm Kit.** A storm kit can contain food, water, a battery-operated radio, flashlights, first aid kit, cash, and other needs specific to you and your family.
- **Unplug Electronics.** Installing surge protectors may also help protect expensive electronics from damage during a storm.
- Report Outages. Call DP&L at (877) 468-8243 or go to www.dpandl.com/outage.
- **Be Safe.** Assume any downed line is live. Keep children and pets away.

Water Updates

Fire Hydrant Flushing The Service Department will be flushing hydrants during the week of October 10-14. Flushing is done each year to inspect the hydrants and water system for proper operation. Between the hours of 8:30 am and 3:30 pm, avoid doing laundry and set water softeners to bypass. For more information, call the Utility Billing office at (937) 848-4638.

Water Meter Replacement Program

The water meter replacement program is complete. The program involved either upgrading meters or replacing older meters. The upgrade consists of a low frequency radio transmitter which allows Service Department employees to remotely read the meters from a vehicle on the street. This system has decreased meter reading time and provides more accurate readings.

Bellbrook's Streams

Our streams flow through our community from our neighbors located upstream. Since we all live downstream from someone, it is up to all of us to make clean and clear choices to keep our water clean.

In neighborhoods, stormwater runoff picks up pollutants from motor oil, lawn chemicals, pet waste, salt and litter along the way, before flowing directly into streams and rivers untreated.

- In your neighborhood, keep streams clean and storm drains clear. Do not throw leaves, grass, branches, gas, oil, fertilizer or other hazardous wastes in or near streams or storm drains
- Pick up pet wastes promptly and dispose of properly
- Limit the use of fertilizers and pesticides
- Wash your car in the grass so wash water will infiltrate into the ground rather than run off into the road.

Waste, Recycling & Yard Waste Disposal

Waste Collection Holidays Waste and recycling collection will be delayed one day due to the Labor Day and Thanksgiving Day holidays. Waste and recycling collection will take place on **Saturday, September 10** and **Saturday, November 26** for those weeks.

Bulk Pick-up Large items may be picked up by Rumpke on Fridays. However, you must call ahead and schedule with Rumpke at (800) 223-3960.

Yard Waste The City does not have leaf or yard waste collection service. However, residents may dispose of yard waste with regular trash collection. Rumpke will collect brush in bags or tied in bundles no larger than four feet long and two feet wide. Brown paper yard waste bags are not required by Rumpke.

Storm Drain Dumping & Stream Pollution

Lawn Care Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler. Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts.



Automobiles Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground. Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.

Pet Waste Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria and excess nutrients in local waters. When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly.

Report Suspected Illegal Discharges To report a suspected illegal dumping down a storm drain, call the Bellbrook Service Department at (937) 848-8415 Monday-Friday 7:30 am to 4:00 pm. For after-hours complaints, call (937) 848-8484.

Retired Bellbrook Firefighter Makes Milestone 100th Blood Donation Bellbrook donor, Bill Beeman, has helped save lives by rolling on emergency runs and rolling up his sleeve to donate. On June 16, he made his milestone 100th lifetime donation at the Dayton Community Blood Center.

Bill grew up in the Miami Valley and worked at Wright Patterson Air Force Base in the Air Force Research Lab. He retired after a 33-year career. Bill is also retired from the Bellbrook Fire Department working as a part-time firefighter and paramedic. Bill continues his work for the city by coordinating the department's blood drives and teaching CPR and First Aid Classes.

His work in emergency services led to serving on the Greene County Board of Health, where he is devoted to helping the county be prepared for public health crises. Bill also volunteers with Boy Scout Troop 75 in Beavercreek.

Bill believes being prepared for emergencies includes having the necessary blood supply on hand, and that motivates him to keep donating. "I enjoy doing it," he said. "You know you're helping other folks. You get that phone call a couple of weeks later telling you your blood was used on a certain date at a certain hospital. It really proves that yes, the blood is being used and really affects other peoples' lives."

Open House The Bellbrook Fire Department would like to invite the entire community to join us at our annual Bellbrook Fire Department Open House on Tuesday, October 11, from 6:00 to 9:00 pm.

This collaborative event will be held at Bellbrook Fire Station #2, 4254 West Franklin Street. The whole family is encouraged to visit your fire department and view the various fire, emergency medical displays, and safety presentations. This is a great opportunity for you to meet the fire department members who find it rewarding to voluntarily serve our community. Those residents interested in being part of our exciting fire and emergency medical service team can obtain application information at the event.

Your Bellbrook Fire Department The mission of the Bellbrook Fire Department is to enhance the quality of life in our city and to provide a healthy and safe environment. This is accomplished through the cultivation of community partnerships and promoting progressive public education and awareness.

Smoke Alarms This spring, the Bellbrook Fire Department randomly selected homes in each area of the city to check for working smoke alarms. The firefighters knocked on doors and left door hangers if residents were not home. The department inspected 582 alarms and found that 28.5% of these alarms did not work. Of these alarms, 16% were not operating because of batteries or missing batteries. Overall, 21% of homes did not have a working smoke alarm.

According to NFPA statistics, having a working smoke alarm in the home reduces the risk of dying in a fire by 50%. On average each year, the absence of working smoke alarms account for 60% of home fire deaths. In nearly one-quarter of these home fire deaths, smoke alarms were present but did not sound. The NFPA recommends that you install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home. The NFPA also recommends testing smoke alarms every month and replacing all smoke alarms every 10 years. When a smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.
