


Festival Commemorative Plates

City Council Updates

Police and Fire Department Annual Reports On February 23, Fire Chief Jim Neidhard presented the Fire Department report providing an overview of the department's 2014 fire and emergency medical service activities. On March 9, Police Chief Doug Doherty presented the Police Department report providing an overview of the department's 2014 enforcement and crime prevention activities. Increase Tap-in Fees On February 9, City Council had an extensive discussion with City staff concerning water rates and the status of the water system. On March 9, Council voted in favor of increasing fees charged for tap-ins to the water system.

Water Rates In February, Council decided not to increase water rates in 2015. This is the fourth consecutive year that water rates have remained stable. The average quarterly water bill for a resident remains at \$67.65 based on 13,500 gallons per quarter.

Water Main Extension and Downtown Replacement Project On February 20, a motion was made by City Council to authorize the bidding of the Water Main Extension and Downtown Replacement Project. This project will take place along North Main Street and in the downtown area and will be completed in 2015. Bids have been received and are being reviewed by the city engineer, city staff, and Council.

Municipal & Zoning Code Highlights

In an effort to keep residents informed, certain provisions of the Municipal Code and Zoning Code have been highlighted below.

Property Maintenance Code In today's economy, it is important to do all we can as homeowners or tenants to ensure that the highest property values are maintained in our community. Stable property values are maintained when the appearance of a residential lot and house are neat, clean and orderly. The city works to enforce the Property Maintenance Code to encourage maintenance of property and protect the rights of neighbors. Please see below for a list of common property maintenance violations:

- Vegetation Code enforcement officers are out on a regular basis throughout the spring, summer and fall to inspect properties for overgrown grass and bushes. Grass must be kept below 8 inches in height. Bushes and weeds must be trimmed and not permitted become overgrown.
- Accessory Structures Structures such as garages, sheds, permanent outdoor play equipment and fences need to be structurally sound and in good repair at all times.
- ◆ **Junk Vehicles** No inoperable or unlicensed motor vehicle should be parked on a property. No vehicle is allowed to be in a state of disassembly. Vehicles such as these are not allowed to be parked outside of a residence but may be placed inside a garage and out of view
- Outside Storage The storage of miscellaneous items must be within an enclosed structure or screened according to the Zoning Code.
 Miscellaneous items can include indoor furniture, automotive parts, building materials and other items that are not common for outdoor yard recreation or use.
- Brush Piles One brush pile per property is allowed.
- Protective Treatment All exterior surfaces of a structure are to be waterproof and free from peeling paint or rotting materials.
- **Gutters** Roof drains and downspouts are to be maintained and in good repair. Roof water should not cause a nuisance to your neighbors.
- Garbage Cans Garbage and recycling pickup is on Friday of each week. Garbage cans are allowed to be placed in the public right of way
 (end of your driveway) beginning on Thursday of each week and must be picked up by Saturday. Garbage cans must also have a tight
 fitting lid to keep rodents out of your garbage.

Zoning Code The Zoning Code regulates the placement of buildings, vehicles, signs and other items on property in the city.

- Vehicle Parking Vehicles, trailers, boats or recreational vehicles are **not** permitted to be parked in the grass on any property in the city. Vehicles must be parked in the garage, driveway or on the street and be operable. Trailers, boats and recreational vehicles can be parked in the garage, driveway or in the side yard or rear yard on a hard surface or compacted gravel.
- Animals The city limit is 4 dogs and/or cats. Be sure to pick up your pet's waste whether it's on your own property or on your neighbor's property and keep your dog on a leash when walking.
- Signs Garage sale, contractor and real estate signs are only allowed on the property where the activity is taking place and for limited periods. The code protects the rights of property owners residing on street corners to prevent the placement of these types of signs on private property. Lead-in signs at intersections and signs placed on telephone poles or traffic signs are not permitted. The only time the code is relaxed is during the Community Garage Sale in May with the approval of City Council.
- Permits Many projects done to improve your residence or business require a Zoning Permit, Greene County Building Permit or both.

Bellbrook Beautification Awards

For many years, volunteers from the community have taken part in honoring homeowners with properties that are well-maintained and stand out from the rest. Ten homes and several businesses are chosen each year to receive the awards. A home or business may only win an award once every five years.

The committee begins their process in late June and takes several weeks to make their final decisions. The City is divided into five sections with each section having two homes selected along with one or two businesses. Properties are voted upon by committee members and then are presented with a plaque by the City Council in the fall. They also receive an engraved landscaping stone with the words, "Bellbrook Beautification Winner."

The Works

Water Meter Replacement Program The water meter replacement program started in 2009 and will be completed in 2015. The program involves either upgrading meters or replacing older meters. The upgrade consists of a low frequency radio transmitter which allows Service Department employees to remotely read the meters from a vehicle on the street. This system has decreased meter reading time from several days to less than 4 hours per month. The upgrade also provides more accurate readings.

Street Repairs and the 2015 Paving Program The Service Department has been busy patching potholes. Please call (937) 848-8415 to report any potholes you may find. The streets being considered for the 2015 Paving Program are Washington Mill Road, Beryl Drive, Garry Drive, a section of Bledsoe Drive, and a short section of West Franklin Street.

Catch Basin Cleaning The Service Department cleans all storm sewer catch basins each year and is nearly complete for 2015. Keeping catch basins clear of debris allows storm water to be collected and prevents potential high water issues and property damage. Remember that catch basins are for storm water only. If you see anybody putting yard waste, motor oil, or any foreign objects into a catch basin, report this activity immediately to the Service Department at (937) 848-8415.

Yard Restorations The Service Department will soon begin yard restorations from damage created from the winter activities. The damage may be caused from water system repairs or snow plowing operations. You can call (937) 848-8415 to verify that your address is on our list.

Street Sign Replacement Program There is currently a federally mandated street sign replacement program. The Service Department has been actively working on this program for some time. This summer, you will see crews stopping at all signs and collecting information. This program will be completed in 2015. You can call (937) 848-8415 for additional information.





Water Rates Remain Steady

The City of Bellbrook will not increase water rates for the fourth straight year. At the City Council meeting on Monday, February 9, City Manager Mark Schlagheck made a presentation to Council concerning water rates and the status of the City's Water Fund. Given the stability of the Water Fund and the city's management of the water system's resources, Council decided to hold water rates at current levels. The last water rate increase was passed by Council in February 2011. The Bellbrook Service Department also presented a video to provide Council and the public with an overview of the water system.

According to the annual *City of Oakwood Water and Sewer Rate Survey*, water rates increased in communities throughout the region by an average of 13% from 2012 to 2015. The City of Bellbrook has not increased rates during those years and is currently below average in what residents pay for water service. Sewer service is provided by Greene County. The city's water system produces about 300 million gallons of water each year and serves approximately 9,000 residents in both the City of Bellbrook and Sugarcreek Township

Personnel Changes In March, Officer Tony Vetter was promoted to the role of Detective following the promotion of Detective Keith Salyers to Sergeant. Sergeant Salyers will join Sergeant Brian Meade in supervising shifts and special assignments. In October 2014, the department welcomed Officers Luke Terry and Josh Warren as part-time staff. 2014 was a year of adjustment for the department, including several retirements and a change in leadership.

Springtime Crime Prevention The Bellbrook Police Department continues to ask residents to think about these crime prevention tips as spring weather approaches:

- Keep doors locked at all times. If you are working in the back yard, keep your front door and garage door closed and locked; and lock your back door when you are in the front yard. Always lock your doors when you leave, even if you only plan to be gone for a few minutes.
- During the spring weather, many people open windows or sliding glass doors while they are at home. Always remember to close and lock your windows and sliding doors when you go to bed or leave the house.
- Put all ladders and other tools back into a secure storage area after you use them. Ladders and other tools can be used by criminals to access your home. Always lock any storage unit or shed you have on your property.
- Be aware of home improvement scams. If you did not solicit the contractor or salesperson who shows up at your door unannounced, do not do business with that person.
- In warm weather months personal property thefts increase. There is a tendency to leave items such as bicycles, gardening tools, lawnmowers, weed eaters, and other yard tools lying around in the open. Make sure you lock up your personal property in your garage or shed. It doesn't take long for someone to ride by and quickly take your property. An open garage door or shed can also be inviting, keep them closed even when you are at home.
- Always remember to roll up your car windows, take any valuables out of your car, and lock your doors every time you exit your vehicle, even if your vehicle is parked in your driveway.
- Being a good neighbor can be one of the best crime prevention tools. Watchful, attentive neighbors can identify activity that is not "normal" to their neighborhoods and alert the Bellbrook Police

- The entity's management letter contains no comments in areas identified by the Auditor's office.

2015 Financial Overview


In December 2014, the Bellbrook City Council adopted the 2015 Annual Budget and the 2015-2019 Capital Improvement Program.


For budgeting purposes, the City breaks its finances into five categories: **Property Tax Supported Funds** (services provided using specific levies approved by the voters and other governmental funding – Police, Fire, General and Capital Improvements); **Transportation Related Funds** (services provided using funds that are restricted for transportation projects – gasoline tax, motor vehicle and permissive license tax revenue); **Water Related Funds** (services provided using funds from water customers including operating, capital and debt); **Waste Collection Fund** (services provided using fees from waste collection customers); **Other Funds** (services provided for other purposes).

The following is a summary of these categories as approved for 2015:

The City's largest revenue source is property tax and related reimbursements at \$3.1 million or 47% of total revenue. The second largest source is charges for services which include water, waste collection and EMS charges. This accounts for \$2.2 million or 33% of total revenue. The third largest source of revenue is capital grants. Several projects will be completed this year with the assistance of grant funding. Capital grants account for \$0.05 million or 9% of revenue. The final significant source of revenue is intergovernmental which includes local funds, gasoline government taxes, permissive license taxes and motor vehicle registrations. This accounts for \$0.5 million or 7% of total revenue.





The City's most significant expense category is wages and benefits. Compensating the police officers, firefighters and service employees of the City costs \$3.7 million or 51% of the total budget of \$7.1 million. Other significant categories include services and supplies at \$1.7 million or 25% and capital outlay at \$1.5 million or 21% of total budget.

Zoning Permit Reminders

The Zoning Code regulates the placement of buildings, vehicles, signs and other items on properties in the city.

- Signs Garage sale, contractor and real estate signs are only allowed on the property where the activity is taking place and for limited periods. The code protects the rights of property owners residing on street corners to prevent the placement of these types of signs on private property. Lead-in signs at intersections and signs placed on telephone poles or traffic signs are not permitted. The only time the code is relaxed is during the Community Garage Sale in May with the approval of City Council.
- Permits Many projects done to improve your residence or business require a Zoning Permit, Greene County Building Permit or both.

Spring Into Action!

- Plant trees, shrubs and ground cover to help rainwater soak into the ground. Keep the soil covered; bare soil is the primary cause of erosion. Mulch bare areas with straw, grass clippings, stones or wood chips.
- Re-direct rain gutter downspouts into landscaped areas instead of onto paved surfaces such as driveways. Rain that falls onto paved areas washes pollutants into the storm drains.
- Consider growing clover in your lawn; its hardy, stands up to wear and produces nitrogen needed by other lawn grasses.


What is Stormwater Runoff?

Stormwater is water from rain or melting snow. It flows from roof tops, over paved streets, sidewalks and parking lots, across bare soil and through lawns and storm drains. As it flows, runoff collects and transports soil, pet waste, salt, pesticides, fertilizer, oil and grease, litter and other pollutants. This water drains <u>directly</u> into Bellbrook's creeks, streams and rivers, without receiving any treatment at sewage plants.

Eight Tips for a Healthy Lawn

Water your established lawn properly
Feed your soil by leaving grass clippings on the lawn
Mow the right way
Weed control sensibly
Aerate your lawn
Dethatch your lawn
Fertilize appropriately
Use lawn substitutes or ground cover in place of grass





Storm Drain Dumping & Stream Pollution

To report an illegal discharge, call the Bellbrook Service Department at (937) 848-8415 Monday through Friday 8:30 am to 4:00 pm. After hours, call (937) 848-8484. Storm drains are designed to handle stormwater runoff **only** and do not provide treatment to water or other substances that enter the system. The Bellbrook Service Department manages the storm drain system in the city. Public education and participation in reporting sightings or evidence of suspicious substances being dumped down storm drains or directly into our local creeks is an important part in preventing water pollution. Odors, unnatural colors or dead fish are signs that something harmful has entered the water.

As part of our Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE) program, we ask citizens who suspect that they have witnessed illegal dumping into a storm drain or water pollution to contact the Bellbrook Service Department at the numbers above. If you are not sure whether an illegal discharge has occurred, please report it and we will determine whether action is required to protect the water supply and/or the environment.
