

COVID-19 Information

At time of publishing, the COVID-19 response state-wide had escalated to include cancellation of events, closure of colleges and universities and travel bans.

City officials are closely monitoring the situation and in constant contact with local health and emergency management officials. We ask that you stay informed by credible sources such as the Center for Disease Control and the Ohio Department of Health along with Greene County Public Health.



The Ohio Department of Health has opened a call center to answer questions regarding COVID-19. The call center will be open 7 days a week from 9 a.m.-8 p.m. and can be reached at

1-833-4-ASK-ODH (1-833-427-5634).

Call center staff includes licensed nurses and infectious disease experts. They will be available to answer questions and provide accurate information about COVID-19, the risk to the public, and the state's response.

As this situation evolves we ask that residents take all necessary precautions to keep yourself, your family and your community safe including:

- Washing hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds
- Cover your mouth with a tissue or sleeve when sneezing or coughing
- Stay home when you are sick
- Clean "high-touch" surfaces daily (doorknobs, light switches, bathroom fixtures, phones, keyboards, desks)

Franklin Street Pilot Crosswalk

The City has been committed to walkability. A vital component is ensuring pedestrian safety in the community. Based on feedback from citizens, the City will be installing a temporary midblock crosswalk to connect the Dairy Shed and the Library along West Franklin Street. This is a busy area frequented by all and especially the younger population. The Service Department will paint striping and add a free-standing sign in the middle of the roadway. City staff will monitor the traffic and pedestrian patterns to determine if the crosswalk makes sense as is or if it needs adjustment. We welcome any and all feedback as this is tested. The crosswalk will be installed prior to the Sugar Maple Festival and will remain in place for one to two months depending on how the walk is received.

Please exercise caution in this area as pedestrians will be utilizing this new crossing! If a pedestrian is in the walkway, motorists must yield.



Solution for Little Sugarcreek Road Still Being Explored

During the February 10th meeting of City Council, a presentation was made on a possible solution to help stabilize Little Sugarcreek Road. Information was presented on stream restoration techniques that could help to clean out fallen trees that have




created log jams and caused additional erosion at the creek level. Those natural materials could then be used to help redirect the stream away from the bank at the base of the road to prevent further damage.

This solution has the potential to save the City from spending more than its annual budget on building a wall to stabilize the road that was previously proposed. City staff continues to meet with experts in this area to help determine if this solution could help alleviate the issues with the road up above the creek level. Staff is also looking at various grants that could assist in the funding for such a solution. As we learn more we will be sure to share with residents and community members.

City Seeks to be part of "Age Friendly Community Network"

City Council approved membership in the AARP Network of Age-Friendly Communities. This was done by resolution at the February 21st meeting.

As part of the membership, the City will commit to a three year process which will create open communication with our older population in the community and use that information to conduct a needs assessment and develop an action plan. This process will allow the City to intentionally engage those 50 and up in Bellbrook to better understand their needs and find ways to meet those needs as we continue to move the community forward in our planning processes. We are hopeful that connecting with this population of residents will allow them to be heard and their needs met.

We are in the process of building a webpage on our website to distribute a survey and more information. Keep checking back as we build out this information. We will also put more information in future newsletters as well.

Greene County Increases Grant Award

For the second year in a row Greene County Commissioners distributed money to each township, village and city. This year they revised their



formula which resulted in Bellbrook receiving an additional \$19,000 for a total of \$30,000 received.

This money will be used on a project yet to be identified and reported back to the county. Last year's grant was used to secure other grants for two pedestrian projects. Staff is working to find a project that will be of benefit to the entire community. Stay tuned for more information on how this grant will be used!

The Bellbrook Fire Department is a combination department with 8 full-time employees, 12 part-time employees, and 3 resource members. The fire services provided to the citizens of Bellbrook has a Class 2 Public Protection Classification (PPS), placing the community in the top 3 percent of those evaluated throughout the nation.

The department operates 2 engines, 1 ladder truck; 3 ambulances, and 3 staff vehicles. They also have 9 paramedics, 11 Emergency Medical Technicians, and 1 medical director.



Calls for assistance by Day of the Week




Tornado Safety

Spring typically marks the beginning of tornado season in Ohio (even though they can occur at any time of the year). We want to remind citizens of the basic precautions to take if there is threat of any type of severe weather in our area.

It is important to have a family plan in place and to practice it. Knowing where to go if you are indoors or outdoors is important. If outdoors, try to safely head to the nearest sturdy shelter. If indoors, move to a pre-designated shelter such as a basement or lowest level. Do not worry about opening windows first, heading to the safest place possible is the most important.

Items that you should have handy in your home include a battery operated NOAA weather radio and a paper map of the area around your home. The radio will be the most effective as it will not require internet or electricity to operate (but be sure to regularly check the batteries or keep a spare set near the radio). The map will also come in handy to look up storm movements and better determine if you are threatened.

You may also sign up for Hyper-Reach alerts that are pushed out to those in areas directly affected by different emergencies including tornadoes. You can choose to receive a text message, phone call or email. The Hyper-Reach sign up is on the City of Bellbrook's homepage—www.cityofbellbrook.org.

About the Service Department

The Service Department operates and maintains the water system serving the city and part of Sugarcreek Township. Currently, the city has one employee with a Class 2 Operator's License and five employees with a Class 1 Operators License. The Ohio EPA requires the city to have a minimum of one employee with a Class 1 Operator's License. The water system serves over 9,000 people in the city and township. The department also maintains city streets, storm sewers, and city buildings.

Pedestrian Improvement Projects

Staff met to finalize plans for the North West Street sidewalk addition and pedestrian improvements. This project is being funded in part by a Greene County Community Development Block Grant. The project will add curb, sidewalk and ADA



compliant ramps to connect Franklin Street to the east side of North West Street back to Bellbrook Plaza. This project will be completed this summer.

The Franklin Street bridge project will add sidewalk along the south side of the street over the Little Sugarcreek has been moved up from fiscal year 2023 to fiscal year 2022. This important project will also add a mid block crosswalk just east of Dot's.

The City continues to identify pedestrian improvements downtown and seek grant funding for those important projects to maximize how City dollars are spent.

Bellbrook—A Look Back in History


This page is a continuation of dedicating a page in the newsletter to the City's history. All information came from a document titled "Outline Early History of Bellbrook" Compiled by Robert Gooding. The information was condensed from newspaper articles, the 1966 Bellbrook Sesquicentennial Book and Bellbrook Historical Society Book. We hope you find this timeline fun and informative!

1797

Joseph Vance, Sr. built a small, one room log cabin which was the first building on the site of Bellbrook, located on the Pickney Road. Joseph Vance, Sr. eventually moved and became the director of the county seat in 1803 and soon afterwards laid out the town of Xenia and a few years later, Urbana. Vance's cabin passed into the hands of James Clancy who built a two story log building in front of Vance's cabin. The log building was used as a tavern and the cabin was used as a kitchen.

1815

James Clancy, Stephen Bell and Henry Opdyke, all landowners in the area, decided to plat a town. They had 84 lots surveyed. After much discussion, Bellbrook was the name they settled on after Stephen Bell and the brook from the small stream that flowed behind the tavern. A notice appeared in the Dayton and Xenia papers stating that "lots in said town will be sold to the highest bidder on Saturday, the 7th of October,



1820

The 1820 census listed 16 families in Bellbrook with a total population of 83.

1832

As Bellbrook continued to grow, discussion regarding incorporating the village began. Dr. William Frazier drafted a petition to the state legislature seeking to incorporate the village of Bellbrook. After many residents signed the petition, Bellbrook was duly incorporated February 13, 1832.

1844

The Methodist Church was built at 55 East Franklin Street and the congregation still meets in the original sanctuary today.

1869

Council voted to put gravel on the streets in an attempt to try to control the dust and mud.

1883

Telephones came to Bellbrook.



1886

Bread was selling for 6 one pound loaves for \$0.25 at Buckles Bakery on North Main Street.

1891

Pearl fishing in the Little Miami River was a source of employment for many peoples. It would begin on the first of June and continue until the water became too cold in the fall. The largest pearl known weighed 2 and 5/8 carats and was sold for \$60 when the average price ran from \$5-\$20 for a pearl.

1900

The census was 375 people. A traction went into operation on the 23rd of April between Dayton and Spring Valley through Bellbrook. During the heyday of the magnetic springs, the citizens of Bellbrook wanted it to be easier for people to come to Bellbrook and finally decided on a traction line.

1915

On June 17, 1915, Council passed a motion to allow Dayton Power & Light to erect poles and wires and furnish electricity to the Village on August 30, 1915. DP&L was also granted a contract to install 12 street lights at a cost of \$36 a month.

1919

On the morning of April 30 flames destroyed a quarter of the business section of Bellbrook. It started by an overheated stove in the back of Schwartz Grocery Store on the northwest corner of Main and Franklin and destroyed 8 buildings before it was brought under control.

<u>1950</u>

The census recorded 400 people. A water system was installed in Bellbrook.

1972

Since Bellbrook had more than 5,000 people, it met state requirements to become a city. The City Council appointed a Charter Commission who drafted a home rule charter. It was voted in November 1971 to adopt the charter. On January 1, 1972, it became effective that Bellbrook was a city.

1999

The population in Bellbrook is 8,500 as of February of 1999.

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Sugar Maple Commemorative Plates

Did you know that the Sugar Maple Festival used to have a handcrafted plate designed each year for the festival? This started in 1979 with the original plates being created in the studio of local Doug Short who designed them. The images were decals with the first being designed by local artist Ed Berry. The images were applied by members of the festival committee and then fired onto the plates. Only 100 were made each year and were hand numbered by the festival committee. One plate was always given to the museum and one to the City.

Each year, after the first plate was created, people were asked to submit black and white drawings of their ideas for a plate and the festival committee then picked a winner to be used for that years plate. As the years went by, the plates were eventually created by a different company and artists were usually from Bell-brook but a few from outside the community. The plates remained limited to 100 produced. Each of the plates had writing on the back that told the story of that particular plate and information about the artist.

The City has framed and matted images of the plates from 1979 to 2003 that are housed in the City building. The images were all in a rarely used room of the building and were moved to the second floor lobby a few months ago to be more prominently displayed. If you find yourself in the City building for any reason, be sure to stop by the second floor lobby to see these wonderful pieces of history.
